Was the Revolution Televised?

Kendrick Lamar's Super Bowl Halftime show was more than a surface level music performance; it was a calculated political statement. On February 9, 2025, Lamar captivated over 133 million viewers with a rich performance in symbolism, cultural references and bold artistic options, challenging social norms.



From the costumes to stage design, every element was carefully designed to convey a message about racial inequality, cultural identity and political unrest, which strengthens the event as a historical moment in super bowl history. Lamar's attire featured a jacket with the word 'Gloria', which pays homage to black history and culture. A giant playstation is a symbol of the gamification of the platform, and the elusive American dream. The dancers additionally formed a divided American flag during the anticipated performance of "HUMBLE". The inclusion of major figures

added layers to the political remarks of the performance. Samuel L. Jackson's illustration of Uncle Sam provided a sarcastic yet thought provoking statement; controlling control over African American artistic expression. The presence of Serena Williams, performing the crip walk during "Not Like Us", celebrated not only her Compton roots, but also hinted at the past criticisms of cultural pride.

The performance also took a direct approach to global issues. Waving the Sudani-Filistini flag, a protector briefly took the center stage, taking a stand against international conflicts for justice and human rights. While the security quickly removed the person, this moment has gone viral. Showing the need and desire for activism in entertainment. The NFL and ROC Nation carefully responded, issuing statements, who removed themselves with any clear political support and accepted the artistic merit of performance.

Nevertheless, the public reaction was electric. The number of audiences for the HalfTime show was last seen at 133 million, which was the most in history. Social media also praised some of the fearless messages of Lamar, while others criticized the show's extreme political nature. In between songs during the perfor-

mance, Lamar announced clearly into the microphone, "The revolution's about to be televised. You picked the right time, but the wrong guy." This word choice was especially fascinating as President Trump was in the audience during the show.



Many suspect that this insinuates the people of America voted for the wrong president and put the wrong person in power during a time of real change. The statement also played homage to a famous quote from Gil Scott-Heron, "The Revolution will not be televised," which has often been used by activists to imply that the media will not represent everyone's voices equally. Critics and cultural commentators largely agreed to one thing: his super bowl Halftime Show was not just entertainment - it was a cultural flashpoint, forcing millions of people to face the realities of greed, power and identity in the US.

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Ragebaiting: The New Money Maker in Social Media

In the fast-paced world of social media, influencers and content creators are increasingly siding with controversial tactics known as "ragebaiting" to achieve viral success. Sincerity and authenticity are no longer important; instead, postings, films, and photos that provoke anger or disgust are becoming the norm, demonstrating that damaging a reputation can be a profitable tactic in today's digital world. A tactic many people are willing to sacrifice their social life for...

In the last six months alone, an insane rise in the prevalence of politically charged and inflammatory content has been seen on platforms like X (formerly known as Twitter). Many users, including influencers, have adopted absurd and provocative statements that often border on hate speech. These posts are designed to trigger emotional responses, knowing full well that a significant portion of their audience may disagree. A recent study found that politically charged posts garner significantly more engagement from users, often creating reactions driven by outrage

rather than agreement (Tulane University). The center of this content baiting lies in social media algorithms; these platforms favor engagement over content quality. A specific tool has shown its success through this rise of baited negative media content;" the "confrontation effect" refers to the tendency of people to engage with content that contradicts their opinions, as observed by Daniel Mochon, a professor of marketing at Tulane University. It's that simple: regardless of the content of a post, the more outrage it elicits, the more people share, comment on, and like it. For aspiring influencers, this means that courting controversy is a guaranteed method of increasing visibility and engagement.

Pop culture references express this trend as well. For example, the infamous Pepsi ad featuring Kendall Jenner sparked outrage for overshadowing social justice movements. Campaigns like this show just how poorly a received campaign can still foster extensive discussions and engagement online (Brandbassador). The shocking volume of interactions feeds the

algorithms, bringing in demand information to the spotlight. All the while undermining the core message for criticism. Engagement is what these platforms need, after all



Unsurprisingly, ragebaiting has complications that go beyond basic interaction. While it is a useful strategy for influencers to become more well-known, it also is a concerning change in public discourse; sensationalism frequently outweighs important discussion. In a world where social media thrives on outrage, influencers and content creators face a dilemma: mastering chaos is the only true way to succeed in today's world of content.

So in all, if you can't hack it through genuine content, ruffle some feathers instead!

Jane Austen's Pride and Prejudice is a remarkable novel about love, misunderstandings, and learning to see people for who they truly are. 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The AI Detection Crisis

You're sitting at your computer, typing away to finish your essay due tomorrow. The thought of using AI crosses your mind, but you don't need to even touch it. Everything is going so well, and the ideas are just flowing naturally. You finally finish the essay, and turn it in on Canvas or Turnitin. A couple of days later, you get an email from your professor: "Your essay has been flagged as 35% written by AI, and you have received a 0/100 on the assignment as a result."

This exact scenario has already happened to me three times for my classes at MiraCosta College. This isn't a rare occurrence either; students across the country are being falsely accused of using AI on their writing assignments, suffering significant grade drops and poor mental health. A student from the University of North Georgia was falsely accused of using AI and received a 0% on her writing assignment. Her grade dropped so low that her GPA fell below the standards for her scholarship, costing her a significant amount of money. Furthermore, she was put onto academic probation, taking six months to appeal. Without knowing how to defend her innocence, the student, already struggling with mental health, was overwhelmed by anxiety.

Most colleges and universities in the United States utilize Turnitin or sim-

ilar plagiarism/AI detection tools. Some high schools (including Grauer) have also begun to adopt this grading style. These tools are inherently flawed, since there is no definitive way to tell if text is generated by AI. It is entirely possible for someone to coincidentally write a sentence exactly the same way an AI would; AI text-generation softwares were designed to mimic natural human language, after all. After being accused so many times myself, the idea of intentionally writing worse, if it meant not being flagged, came to mind. In fact, Turnitin themselves state,

"Our AI writing detection model may not always be accurate (it may misidentify human-written, AI-generated, and AI-generated and AI-paraphrased text), so it should not be used as the sole basis for adverse actions against a student."

Regardless of this warning, most professors still grade students' work based on these tools. Furthermore, they set the cutoff for the "acceptable level of AI" far too low, generally around 25%. Actually, I consider this level of AI content to be a good indicator that it is written by a human.

Thankfully, schools are slowly adjusting to this new grading criteria. At MiraCosta College, most teachers allow you to "prove your innocence" (though still a very flawed method) by either sharing your edit history and thought/creative

process, or joining a Zoom meeting and discussing your paper. Still, these methods require significant effort, sometimes taking even longer than writing the actual essay took. Therefore, as a student, it is best to be prepared in the case that you do get falsely accused. Firstly, and most obviously, don't use AI. Not even to paraphrase, do research, or write an outline. Even if you intentionally avoid directly writing what it generates, you might subconsciously reuse some of its wording and sentence struc-

Secondly, write all of your notes and drafts on one Google document (which has an extensive edit history feature), making it obvious that your thoughts are original. Finally, be prepared to share your document (and therefore edit history) and have an explanation for your ideas. With this method, I was able to gain 100% of my points back for all three assignments in which I had been accused of using AI.

Still, edit histories and notes can easily be faked, and teachers will eventually "catch on," even if innocent students need to use this method to defend themselves. AI detection tools will most likely never be 100% reliable, and institutions need to develop new, fair methods to allow students to prove their innocence in the classroom.

Higher Education in Hot Water

"Johns Hopkins to lose 2,000 jobs threaten incoming students. after Trump's \$800m cut in USAid funding," an article in The Guardian reads. "Trump administration cancels \$400 million in federal dollars for Columbia University," stated an NPR article earlier this week. "Stanford University" announces it is "freezing staff hiring".

Across the nation, universities are scrambling to cope with extreme budget cuts as they welcome a new class of students. With scholarships to distribute and Ph.D. research to fund, these budget cuts

For undergraduates, these cuts warn of larger class sizes and fewer academic resources or scholarship opportunities. Graduate students, especially Ph.D. candidates, face even steeper challenges. Ph.D. candidates are often compensated heavily for their research, enriching the school's academic community with their contributions. Without grants or scholarships, few will be able to afford the considerable prices these programs require. The University of Pennsylvania, for example, asked de-

partments to reduce their incoming Ph.D. cohorts. Some students with informal offers received notices that they no longer had a place in their program, and their acceptances were rescinded.

Wendy Roth, Chair of Graduate Education in Penn's sociology department, described the experience of informing students they were no longer accepted. "Two of them were extremely upset. One person was in tears," Roth said. "It's just the most terrible thing to get that kind of news when your plans are made." Continuted on Page 4

Ph.D. candidates will be admitted, limiting mentorship for undergraduates and reducing the availability of teaching assistants. At Penn, the history department's Ph.D. cohort was cut from 17 students to only seven. The typical group of nine to twelve students in English can now only be a maximum of six. The biological sciences graduate program at UC San Diego has shrunk its class from 25 to 17 students, cutting opportunities for aspiring researchers. Fewer graduate students will mean larger

personalized learning experience integral to some smaller, research-based programs.

Students aren't the only ones impacted; North Carolina State University, Stanford University, and the University of Louisville have all announced hiring freezes in response to anticipated funding losses. Temporary hiring freezes may not cause much disruption, but if these same circumstances continue, limited job opportunities in academia will disrupt the job economy.

The situation has left universi-

With reduced funding, fewer undergraduate class sizes, eliminating the ties like Yale and Columbia searching for ways to support students. While Yale has pledged to fund research programs through internal resources temporarily, Columbia has had to reduce its incoming Ph.D. class significantly.

> These next few years outline an unprecedented time for students applying to college. Without grants to fund research opportunities, college tuition increasing, and scholarship and aid dwindling, no one can anticipate how these changes will impact the future of higher education.

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The 2025 Oscars

The 97th Academy Awards, held on March 2, 2025, celebrated a remarkable year in cinema, with standout films and performances taking center stage. 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Greta Thunberg: Where is She Now?

Almost everyone has heard of Greta Thunberg, the youth activist fighting climate change at protests and in the United Nations. But where is she now? It's been a few years since she was a big headline. There could be quite a few reasons for this. One is that nothing sticks around in the media for very long. She managed to stay relevant for about two years, and for an activist, that is pretty good. Because so much is constantly happening in the world, the turnover of news stories is very fast-paced.



Additionally, as news becomes more repetitive, people become desensitized to the problems being presented through the media. As they talked more often about the change, the average news consumer became indifferent to what she was saying. A current example of this is the recent plane crashes. The first crash was in the news for slightly more than a week because new information was being released. However, the later crashes were only major headlines for a day or two. Given the first incident was larger and involved more people, it still received disproportionately larger media coverage than the others. This reflects Greta's appearances in the media. While at first she was covered semi-often, as she continued speaking about the same or similar issues in the same way, it became less interesting and, therefore, less newsworthy.

Greta's early activism centered around attending and organizing various types of protests and calling out adults for not doing enough to help the generations after them. While those efforts are great, they didn't keep her in the spotlight. Her issue? She has not changed (though that's not necessarily a bad thing). She is still calling people in places of power out

Swedish teenager fighting against climate on not doing enough and is still attending protests. Additionally, her areas of activism have expanded, now covering more civil and social issues along with climate change. With these new topics, she has found herself in more controversial arenas. This further diminishes the press' interest in publishing major headlines about her. She is no longer the autistic girl from Sweden calling out the leaders around her; she has lost the "oh, a kid cares" attention. Now, as an adult, her methods have grown more "aggressive" in the eyes of many. "Once lauded as an environmental star, the Swedish activist appears to have embraced thuggish tactics over delicate diplomacy," Marianka Swain uses as the subheading for her The Telegraph article: "Greta Thunberg's descent from climate darling to militant pro-Palestine mouthpiece." The agitated wording demonstrated by Swain shows how Greta is perceived in today's news. Due to media fatigue from repetitive stories, growing up, a change of focus, and development in her style of activism, she has fallen out of favor with the media and, thanks to that, out of the public eye.

DC Crash Recognition

A tragic mid-air collision occurred on January 29, 2025, over Washington DC, taking the lives of 67 people. Those involved were passengers and crew members on the American Airlines Flight 5342 and the U.S. Army Black Hawk helicopter, which unfortunately collided with one another. Among the victims were various dedicated professionals, skilled figure skaters, and beloved family members. Two young skaters with a promising future, Spencer Lane, 16, and Jinna Han, 13, also passed during the crash. Both were skilled skaters at the Skating Club of Boston. Spencer, known for his rising talent and skill on the ice, was accompanied by his mom, Christian Lane. Jinna, praised for her technical skills on the ice, was also accompanied by her mother, Jin Han. The loss of young talent has forever impacted the skating community. These young stars were not the only popular skaters aboard Flight 5342; famous Russian figure skaters Vadim Naumov, 55, and Evgenia Shishkova, 52, also perished on this flight. World champions in the 1990s, the married couple had moved to Connecticut together in 1998 and were highly praised coaches at the Skating Club of Boston. They were flying home from a camp in Kansas, teaching young, talented skaters. Their son, Maxim Naumov, a competitive skater himself, had left Kansas 2 days earlier and was thankfully not on the flight. The U.S. Army Black Hawk helicopter crew included three dedicated soldiers:, Captain Rebecca M. Lobach, Chief Warrant Officer Andrew Loyd Eaves, and Sergeant Ryan O'Hara. The helicopter was on a training mission out of Fort Belvoir when the midnight collision occurred. The crash happened while the airport was understaffed with only one traffic control

worker at the Reagan National Airport, a job usually led by two.



This tragic collision claimed the lives of individuals from diverse backgrounds, including athletes, family members, and military personnel. Each victim has left behind a legacy of talent, perseverance, and commitment to their communities. As loved ones mourn and many continue to pay tribute, we honor their contributions and the impact they left on those around them.



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
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
