Thousands of Blue "Jellyfish" Wash Up on San Diego Beaches

If you have been to the beach recently, you may have seen dozens of blue, jellyfish-like creatures covering the shoreline. For the past month, these creatures have been washing up on San Diego beaches in mass quantities. These animals are called *velella velellas*, or more commonly known as by-the-wind-sailors due to their distinctive sail.

They can grow up to eight centimeters and float along the ocean's surface. Along with their sail, they are frequently characterized by their bright blue pigment, which makes them stand out along beaches. This feature is used for camouflage to match the color of the water. It also protects them from the sun's UV rays which they are constantly exposed to, being at the surface of the water. Commonly mistaken as a type of jellyfish, they are actua-

we are witnessing recently. Since they float along the ocean surface, they have no control over their movement and go wherever the wind and currents push them. This is how they often end up on beaches in large amounts after storms or weird weather patterns. They also accumulate in areas with high amounts of food. By-the-windsailors eat microscopic organisms called zooplankton and other fish larvae using their tentacles. Although not painful to humans, these tentacles still have a sting that affects the smaller organisms that they prey on.

Due to this year's earlier storms, it created the perfect combination of wind and food that caused the velellas to wash ashore in such large amounts. Live velellas will continue to have their bright blue coloration and some are eventually pulled back out into the ocean by the tide. If left out of water too long, they will eventually dry up and lose their blue pigmentation, leaving them fully transparent. Although this may seem like a mass die out, it is a natural occurrence that occurs every couple years.

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The WGA Strikes Back

Screenwriters are often overlooked when it comes to accolades in Hollywood- film is a primarily visual medium, and the quality of a line can come down to the actor delivering it. When a person works behind the scenes, it can be difficult to be awarded the credit and payment you are due. Thus, the WGA- the Writer's Guild of America- was formed in 1933, with the aim of improving the lives of all writers through creating minimum wages and better working conditions.

The WGA and the AMPTP (Alliance for Motion Pictures and Television Producers) have long been at odds with each other, due to the AMPTP frequently ignoring the WGA's demands for better pay and reduced working hours in favor of overworking screenwriters so Hollywood can provide a steady stream of blockbuster films. According to the March WGA progress report, the average pay a screenwriter receives has decreased by 14% in the last five years, with over half of screenwriters being paid the bare minimum wage. Writers were also concerned with the creation of AI, with executives wanting use AI to write their films due to the lower pay required. After negotiations with AMPTP failed on April 17 of this year, the WGA announced that members of the guild would be going on strike on May 2, 2023, until their members could receive better pay.

The last time the WGA went on strike was fifteen years ago, with writers refusing to create material from November 5 of 2007 to February 12 of 2008. During

that period, popular shows such as *Breaking Bad, Lost,* and *Friday Night Lights* lost episodes, with producers scrambling to write scripts due to the lack of writers. Shows that aired weekly such as *Saturday Night Live* went on hiatus or suffered from a lower quality of content. Reality TV exploded, pushing shows like *The Real Housewives* and *Keeping Up With the Kardashians* into the public consciousness. *The Apprentice*, Donald Trump's infamous reality te-

levision series, was on the verge of cancellation until executives renewed it due to the lack of writers at the time. The results, however, were effective- the demands of the WGA were answered, giving them jurisdiction over new media and giving WGA members priority when it came to writing screenplays for major productions.

The current strike seems like it will be equally effective: the entertainment industry has lost ten billion dollars in the stock market in just two days. Production has been halted in shows such as Succession, Barry, and Abbott Elementary. Streaming services are already looking to slow the release of their shows, and focus more on content outside of the United States. Protestors have gathered outside the offices of executives in Hollywood with signs asking for them to agree to their demands. Celebrities such as writer Neil Gaiman, actress Drew Barrymore, and comedian Bowen Yang have all announced their support of the strike.

Despite the disappointment audiences might feel at their favorite shows being delayed, it's important to remember that writers sacrifice so much time and creativity to produce the popular shows watched by millions, and thus are deserving of respect and fair pay.

Observing Climate Change Firsthand in France

This year for spring expeditions, I got the chance to travel to France and it was one of the most memorable and eye opening experiences I've ever had. We flew into Paris, where we stayed for a day and explored the city before taking the long train and bus ride up to Chamonix. Chamonix is an alpine city located at the intersection of France, Switzerland, and Italy. Surrounded by the French Alps, its largest attractions are the ski slopes of Mont Blanc and the famous Mer de Glace. The Mer de Glace is the largest glacier in France, and the second largest in the entirety of the Alps. It used to be visible from the valley of Chamonix, but has largely receded over the years.

The primary way of reaching the glacier is by a small red railway train that we boarded and rode along the side of the mountain, ascending 2,880 feet. Once exiting the train, we had to take a short gondola ride down to the beginning of the endless amount of descending stairs. When our tour guides discussed the history of the glacier, they told us that the glacier used to be high enough that stairs weren't needed. Now there are 580 steps to get down to the glacier. Since 1939, the Mer de Glace has been shrinking at a rate of 30 centimeters each year. This adds up quickly. Along the stairs, there were signs posted every couple of flights that showed the height of the



glacier in previous years. In 2015, it took 370 steps to get down, and in 1988, it only took three. It was jarring to see how quickly climate change was affecting the environment first hand, and the cascading effects that came with it.

Due to the rapid melting of ice, the compacted ground underneath that had been frozen for years has become loose and unstable. This is causing more rocksli des and avalanches than ever before. While hiking along the glacier, it was never quiet. we could constantly hear the rumble of the glacier moving and deteriorating beneath our feet. Loud crashes of mini rockslides echoed around the basin, the sound being amplified off the canyon walls.

We were seeing the effects of the warming climate in person and not just through a book or screen. Comparing drastically different photos from only two decades earlier to what was directly in front of us, it's hard to believe that this much change at such an unprecedented rate could go unnoticed by so many, and not be a cause of alarm to the people who could make the most difference.



In addition to being known for its celebrity chef, Nobu Matsuhisa, and his high-end Japanese-fusion cuisine, there have been all sorts of celebrity sightings and publicity at its various locations, which has added to its notoriety and fascination over the years. Even though Nobu is such a celebrated global restaurant franchise with devoted foodies worldwide, many in North County may not realize that we have a location in our own backyard, in the Gaslamp District in downtown San Diego.

Although Nobu is on the pricier side and definitely not an everyday eatery, it is a wonderful choice for special occasions - just make sure to make a reservation well in advance, because getting a walk-in seat is likely not possible. I had the privilege of going to Nobu before our prom - and I can attest that all the buzz is totally true. It was absolutely amazing! The menu is abundant with incredible choices and the service staff is very accommodating. My suggestion is to go there with a group of people if possible and order a variety of items to share because there are so many wonderful things to try.

Nobu has been one of the most with a unique flair. They have typical sushi hand rolls or cut rolls, but they also have many other unique and special dishes, like bluefin tuna, wasabi salsa, or prime beef tenderloin. For my pre-prom meal, my friends and I tried several different things from all the parts of the menu. We started off with tuna and salmon skin sushi. which were both so fresh and delicious. My friends and I all noticed that the rice was especially delicious, which may seem like a strange thing to consider, but it made a big impact on the flavor and texture of the rolls.

Next, we ordered the rock shrimp tempura with creamy spicy sauce. I am usually not a fan of spicy things, but this dish was absolutely delicious. It's crispy, creamy, salty, a bit spicy and totally delectable. If you're typically not a fan of fish and you try their black cod miso, you may end up changing your mind. Even though it is plated simply, it is one of the most tender and flavorful pieces of fish I have ever tasted. The way the fish is marinated makes it melt in your mouth. My parents told us before going that a "must-have" item on the menu is the tempura fish and chips - a great reminder to always take your parents' advice, because they are (almost) always ri-Nobu serves Japanese cuisine, but ght! Unlike most fish and chips, the batter

that the fish is fried in is super light and extra crispy, and the fries are thick, yummy, and perfectly seasoned. Lastly, we ordered brussel sprouts dry miso to add some veggies to our meal. Even though it was a fairly simple dish, the sprinkled seasoning on top was super unique and it tasted magnificent!

Admittedly, the price to eat at Nobu is pretty expensive, but the quality of the food and service makes it definitely feel worth it. All the flavors are so rich and interesting and the entire experience is really special. If you need a place to go for birthdays, anniversaries, graduation, or any other special event, I would 100% recommend Nobu.

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An Exploration of Carmilla By Lily T.

novel depicting a sapphic relationship, my mind returns again and again to Sheridan Le Fanu's 1872 classic Carmilla. To be sure, there are so many better queer novels than one written as a homophobic allegory almost two hundred years ago. There are so many valid criticisms about the work and its depiction of women and lesbian relationships. Why, then, does Carmilla hold me in such a thrall?

Carmilla follows a girl named Laura, who is hidden away in the mountains, isolated from society by her controlling father. One day, she discovers a mysterious girl buried under the wreckage of a carriage, and thus Carmilla comes to stav in their home. At first, all seems normal between the two, except for Laura becoming increasingly unsettled by Carmilla's declarations of love and intimate gestures. However, as Laura begins to fall ill, her father discovers Carmilla to be a centuries-old vampire and, with the help of neighboring physician lens of this unreliable narrator, the abrupt

Whenever I think of my favorite Doctor Hesselius, murders her on the spot.

It's easy to forget that LGBTQ+ being accepted as normal is a recent thing. I grew up ashamed of my own queerness. The main messaging I got from the media was that lesbians were predators, monsters hiding deep in closets. I think it's for that reason I was drawn to Le Fanu's work. Carmilla is written to be a monster. However, she comes across as more sympathetic than anyone else in the novel. When reading through the story, I kept being drawn to the aspects of the story left unexplored: the fact that Laura is hidden away from society. She has little to no autonomy and is completely disconnected from people her own age, with her father, governesses, and physician making all of her choices for her. The story itself begins with a foreword by Doctor Hesselius, meaning at no point in the book does Laura have control over her narrative- it has been edited and distributed by men. Viewing the story through the

ending and Laura's claims of discomfort feel less natural- she seems far happier with the parasitic vampire than any other character in the novel. Only when she's with Carmilla does it ever seem like she's being recognized as a human being rather than an object.

Rather than viewing *Carmilla* as a cautionary tale about the dangers of female agency and sapphic relationships, I see it as a horror story about male control and lack of female autonomy. It also feels strangely affirming- Carmilla's depiction as a monster reminds me of my own experience and feelings of self loathing in a way that many contemporary queer novels fail to capture, while also creating a character that is sympathetic despite her unnatural state. Carmilla might be a monster, but it says a lot about society at the time that only a monster could see a woman as a human being.

Ride Review: TRON Lightcycle/Run

Readers, you are about to be digitized into the world of TRON! On April 4, 2023, TRON Lightcycle/Run fully opened to all guests at Walt Disney World. This attraction opened days after the conclusion of Walt Disney World's 50th Anniversary, which was an extended 18 month celebration. This attraction is located at Magic Kingdom and has become a substantial part of Tomorrowland. Being 5 years in the making, the start of the attraction's construction also forced the closure of the Walt Disney World Railroad for that same time period, which made its reopening weeks before TRON's debut.

Taking place after the events of the film TRON: Legacy, this attraction invites guests, otherwise known as users, to go on an action packed adventure on their own Lightcycles around the grid. Guests become "members" of Team Blue and compete against Team Orange.

TRON Lightcycle/Run is sponsored by Enterprise and is a direct copy of the version in Shanghai Disneyland. TRON uses a different kind of ride vehicle, where riders have to straddle a motorcycle with ankle and back restraints. As this is a considerably strange element to the ride, there is a test vehicle outside the entrance of the queue for guests to familiarize themselves with the mechanics of the ride. In addition, TRON is the first ride at Disney World to implement a mandatory locker system. Before entering the loading area, guests must secure a locker to store any backpacks or any loose items. These lockers are free and guests can occupy one using their Magic-Band or an access card that can be provided by a cast member.

TRON Lightcycle/Run is a one of a kind attraction. This ride delivers a futuristic experience to guests, which makes this ride perfect for Tomorrowland. With a top

speed of 59 miles per hour, TRON is one of Disney World's fastest roller coasters. Inside the queue, guests can see current riders launch and blast through a portion of the grid. Although it is only a 2 minute long attraction, TRON is a very immersive and thrilling roller coaster with some stunning visual and lighting effects in and outside the attraction.

As of writing, TRON Lightcycle/ Run can only be accessed by entering the virtual queue via the Walt Disney World mobile app. Guests can join the queue from anywhere at 7am or from Magic Kingdom at 1pm. Those who don't want to wait or are unable to get a spot in the virtual queue have the option of purchasing an Individual Lightning Lane, which grants the ability to essentially "skip the line". TRON Lightcycle/Run is a great addition to Magic Kingdom and Walt Disney World as a whole.

Medieval Paintings found in Ancient Chamber

Research art is a mode of exploration that uses artistic processes to better understand or articulate the subjectivity of human experience. A professor of art and education at Stanford, Elliot Eisner, first coined the term in a conference presentation in 1993. Some practitioners of art-based research trace its origins back to German arts theorist and psychologist Rudolf Arnheim, and American philosopher Susanne Langer. Both inspired a range of academic programs that taught students a process of creating art as a way to understand the nature of human experience, learning, and teaching. When expanding on Eisner's ideas, Canadian researchers developed something they called "a/r/togra-

phy,"which stands for artmaking, researching, and teaching. It has become popular with not only artists but teachers alike, creating a bridge between information and artmaking to inform a larger group on a subject matter. One of the most interesting examples of this art form is a piece by Hans Haacke called Haacke's Shapolsky et al. Manhattan Real Estate Holdings, A Real-Time Social System, as of May 1, 1971 (1971). This work was a simple presentation of facts comprising 142 photographs as well as various texts and charts Haacke found in the New York County clerk's records. On closer inspection, one notices that the corporations that owned the properties were run by a single landlord, Harry Shapolsky, who bought, sold, and mortgaged the properties within his family's own real estate group. Shapolsky had been indicted for bribing building inspectors, since his buildings were in poor condition while maintaining a high profit, leading to him later being convicted of rent-gouging. For institutional critique artists such as Haacke, research is key when investigating and exposing various social systems. In doing so, the aim is to show how what one considers "art" is not timeless but in fact socially constructed, powerfully conditioned by the conventions and normalizing practices of art institutions.

What is Research Art?

Archaeologists recently uncovered hidden rooms filled with Christian paintings in Old Dongola, a desert town in Sudan. Dongola was the capital of medieval Makuria, a kingdom that by the end of the 6th century converted to Christianity. A team from the Polish Centre of Mediterranean Archaeology was exploring houses dating from the 16th and 19th century when they came upon an opening to a small chamber. This room had painted depictions of the Mother of God, Christ, a Nubian ruler, and Archangel Michael. Research suggested that the paintings were created during a time of great pressure for Dongola, an important trade city on the Nile. Dongola flourished for hundreds

of years under peaceful relations between the Christians of Nubia and the Muslims of Egypt. The paintings depict a Nubian ruler, thought to be King David, being shielded by the Archangel Michael. They are accompanied by inscriptions praying for God to protect the city. Archaeologists Dr. Lorenzo de Lellis and Dr. Maciej Wyżgoł consider it "unique for Christian art" according to their article published on April 5, 2023. King David's reign had marked the end for the kingdom, since his actions led to the city being sacked in 1276 by the Mamluk Sultanate. The archaeologists believe that the paintings could have been made while the Mamluk army was approaching or whilst they were laying siege to the city.

In Old Dongola, the chambers are covered with domes and vaults built from dried brick. They are more than 20 feet above the ground level, which has confused archaeologists. The structure was built close to a church from the Makuria kingdom. "I think these structures were built in exactly this place because of the presence of the Great Church of Jesus, which was the largest and most important church in Nubia according to written sources," Artur Obłuski, the project's director, told Artnet News. Although archaeologists have been excavating the area since the 1960s, "despite all the new and fancy methods," Obłuski said, "archaeology still delivers surprises like this one."
